Chicken Wellington

4 boneless chicken breasts 1 tablespoon olive oil

2 tablespoons butter softened and divided 1/4 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon dried rosemary, crushed 1 slightly beaten egg

½ teaspoon rubbed sage 1/4 cup pepper

Slices of Mozzarella cheese

2 packages refrigerated pie pastry or homemade pastry

1 package Williams's gravy (follow instructions on package)

Using a mallet, flatten chicken to ¼ inch thickness. In a large skillet, cook chicken in oil and 1 tablespoon butter for 4-5 minutes on each side or until juices run clear.

In small bowl, combine rosemary, sage, salt, pepper and remaining butter. Unroll pastry sheets; cut each into 9-inch squares. Place a chicken breast on one half of each square. Spread chicken with butter mixture. Place a piece of cheese on top of chicken. Fold pastry over chicken pinch seams to seal. It will look like a hot pocket. Place on a greased baking sheet brush with egg. Bake at 450 degrees for 18-20 minutes or until golden brown.

Steam Vegetables: broccoli, cauliflower, carrots, and zucchini

Strawberry Trifle

1 store bought Angel food cake or home made one

3 baskets strawberries

12 oz cool whip

Sugar

Slice the angel food cake in three sections vertically; each layer will look like a ring. Clean, slice and sugar to taste strawberries. Thaw cool whip. In a trifle bowl layer cake, strawberries and cool whip; ending with cool whip and strawberries for decoration.

Hymn or Worship Song of the Month

Bless Be the Tie That Binds by John Fawcett 1740-1817

John Fawcett was born of poor parents in Yorkshire, England, in 1740. He was converted to Christ as the age of 16 through the ministry of George Whitefield. At the age of 26 he was ordained as a Baptist minister. During one of his ensuing sermons Fawcett shared this hymn text with his congregation. The poem was first printed in 1782 under the title "Brotherly Love", in a collection containing 166 of Fawcett's poems. The tune "DENNIS" originated in Switzerland and was later purchased by Lowell Mason . It was edited in 1845 by Mason and George Webb with the notation, "arranged from H.G. Naegeli".

- Vs. 1 Blest be the tie that binds, our hearts in Christian love! The fellowship of kindred minds is like to that above.
- Vs. 2 Before our Father's throne we pour out ardent prayers; Our fears, our hope, our aims are one, our comforts and our cares.
- Vs. 3 We share our mutual woes, our mutual burdens bear, and often for each other flows, the sympathizing tear.
- Vs. 4 When we asunder part it gives us inward pain; but we shall still be joined in heart, and hope to meet again.
